Unlike English, Spanish has consistent vowel sounds:

- A (ah) – Like "father"
- E (eh) – Like "met"
- I (ee) – Like "see"
- O (oh) – Like "open"
- U (oo) – Like "blue"

One of the biggest pronunciation challenges for English speakers is the rolled "R". While it may seem difficult at first, with practice, it becomes natural.
